

KEY STAGE 3 How do social issues affect people?

What are social issues?

You may have already discussed social issues in Lesson 1 of First Give. As a reminder, a social issue is a problem that affects many members of society. For example:

- Poverty
- Mental health issues
- Climate crisis

- Physical health issues
- Racism
- Homelessness



Identifying issues

Read the story below or listen to it here.

"Grace and Reuben are brother and sister. Grace is in Year 7 and Reuben is in Year 9. They are looked after by their mum.

Their mum's job as a carer for the elderly doesn't pay that well. She has to work hard to provide enough food for them. Her work sometimes means that she can't be at home when Grace and Reuben come home from school. As a result, there sometimes isn't anything for dinner.

Reuben has been getting angry about this and has stopped going home after school. For the last six months, he has been drinking alcohol with a group of older people at the local park until late at night. Grace thinks these boys are involved in a gang, but she is too scared to say anything because Reuben is so angry all the time.

Both Grace and Reuben's grades at school are getting worse. Grace is stressed and anxious and stops speaking at all. Reuben has also started shoplifting. Just little things from the local shop.

One day a teacher speaks to Grace about the fact that she has become so quiet. It takes some time, but eventually Grace opens up about some of the problems. The teacher organises a meeting with Grace's mum and recommends a local youth charity who provide a youth club and advice centre for young people. She also suggests a food bank to make sure they have enough food.

As well as food, the foodbank offers guidance about how they can apply for additional support from the Government.

Grace is still worried about Reuben, but she feels a little better about things."
